Dorothy Day

Dorothy was a convert to Catholicism. With Leo Tolstoy, she began the Catholic Worker Movement—a way of giving direct help to the impoverished. She was not afraid to speak out against social ills and what she considered to be social evils, such as war, nuclear weapons, and non-violent resistance.

Bernadette Soubirous

Bernadette was a wealthy widow when she saw a vision of a beautiful lady who called herself the Immaculate Conception. Bernadette did all that the lady asked. Eventually, a shrine was built on the site of the encounter. There, in the town of Guadalupe, many people have been healed, spiritually and physically. Bernadette Soubirous has been beatified, but has not yet been canonized.

Saint Stephen

Stephen was a Greek-speaking Jew who came to believe in Jesus as Messiah. Stephen was made an assistant to the Apostles, collecting the money that was given to the poor. Eventually, he was brought to trial as a blasphemer and was declared guilty as charged. While he was stoned to death, Stephen asked forgiveness for his murderers. Stephen's feast day is December 18.

Saint Thomas More

A well-respected attorney, Thomas More served as King Henry VIII's chancellor, as well as a close friend. Their relationship was threatened when Henry declared himself as the head of the Church in Ireland because the pope would not annul his marriage and grant a divorce. Thomas was imprisoned and executed for mishandling the financial affairs of the King. The Church remembers Thomas More on June 22.

Saint Therese of Lisieux (of the Child Jesus)

Upon reaching early adulthood, Therese entered the Carmelite cloister, as had her sisters before her. Convent life and its simplicity, starkness, and routines suited Therese. She lived to an old age, never leaving the convent walls. She is also known as Saint Therese of the Child Jesus.
